3	<p>Change and Continuity: Stone, Bronze and Iron Age Through historical enquiry, children will learn how tribes, trade and the development of technology in weapons and farming led to change.</p>	<p>Historical Significance: Egyptians Children will look at how the Ancient Egyptian Empires influenced the world through medicine, art, chemistry and astronomy. Children will understand how we are still influenced by these today.</p>	
4	<p>Historical Significance: Ancient Greece Children will learn the historical significance of Ancient Greek Civilisation. Focusing on the pillars of modern western civilisation, democracy, scientific methodology, written law, art and religion.</p>		<p>Consequence: Roman Britain Children will learn to compare the life in Britain, Rome and Roman Britain with a focus on gods, military, culture and social structure.</p>
5	<p>Change and Continuity: Anglo-Saxons Children will learn how the Saxons settling in Britain changed life. Children will also learn about the impact of the Norman invasion on English identity.</p>		<p>Consequence: Early Islamic Civilisations Children will learn about trade and cultures that were influences by the introduction of the Silk Road.</p>
6		<p>Similarity and Difference: Crime and Punishment Children will learn about real cases of punishment during the Victorian Era. They will compare and contrast these and form an opinion of what is a fairer form of punishment.</p>	<p>Consequence: World War II Using diaries, children will learn about the trenches and evacuees. The children will create their own account using this information.</p>
